# **MASKS**

Since the recent announcement of a province wide K-12 mask mandate, we know many members have questions and concerns. If you have specific questions don't hesitate to contact the BTA Office.

Helpful reminders for the K-12 mask mandate:

- No student should be prevented from attending or fully participating at school if they do not wear a mask
- Schools can support students to practice personal preventive measures by:
  - Having staff model these behaviours.
  - Sharing reliable information, including from the BC Centre for Disease Control and the Office of the Provincial Health Officer, to parents, families and caregivers.
  - Promoting safety measures in the school through the use of visual aids like floor markings and signage.
- Staff should utilize positive and inclusive approaches to engage students in preventive practices and should not employ measures that are punitive or stigmatizing in nature
- Staff should also utilize a trauma-informed lens when planning school activities (e.g. gatherings and
  events) and interacting with other staff and students, including considerations around respecting others
  personal space
- Students and staff may choose to wear face shields or other personal protective equipment in schools beyond the required circumstances outlined in this document, and those choices must be respected.
- School administrators are encouraged to review the information in this section with their school community, to increase awareness and support from staff, students and families.

#### COVID LEAVE

Colleagues there are three options for COVID Leave in the district ADS:

#### 1. COVM (COVID-19 Medical):

This is for staff attending a COVID-19 related appointment. You are to log the absence in the Atrieve (ADS) as absence code COVM. This code should only be used if a staff member is attending a COVID-19 testing appointment. The COVM code pulls from the staff member's sick bank.

#### 2. COVI (COVID-19 Illness):

This is for staff needing to stay home because they are COVID-19 positive (symptomatic). Staff should advise their Administrator/Manager and log the absence in the Atrieve (ADS) using absence code COVI. This code should only be used if a staff member has been diagnosed with COVID-19 and should be used until the staff member has been cleared to return to work. The COVI code pulls from the staff member's sick bank.

#### 3. PLCV (Paid Leave - COVID):

This is for Staff needing to stay home because they are COVID-19 positive but are asymptomatic (are able to work) or directed by a public health official (not by 8-1-1 or a physician) to self-isolate due to potential exposure to COVID-19 and are asymptomatic. Staff should advise their Administrator/ Manager and log the absence in Atrieve (ADS) using absence code PLCV (Paid Leave - COVID). The paid leave code does not require you to use sick days.

BTA members, please call your Administrator/Manager if you are using the PLCV code.

#### REPORTING AND ASSESSMENT

From September 27 until November 5, the government is inviting teachers, parents, and the public to share feedback on the draft K-12 Student Reporting Policy. Teachers reaction to the proposed changes are critical. Teachers are experts on assessment and reporting and our voices need to be heard. Teachers are strongly encouraged to participate in providing feedback to government on this important issue.

An updated policy is expected to be released in January 2022, to be implemented at the start of the 2022–23 school year.

The following points may be of interest to you as you consider your feedback.

- 1. Teachers will be required to provide "learning updates" on student learning, in all subject areas, five times per year (three of these reports must be written).
- 2. The first update must be provided within in the first 25% of the learning period for a particular subject or course.
- 3. All updates on student learning must include student-generated content.
- 4. K-9 updates must use the provincial proficiency scale/Grade 10-12 must use grades and percentages and may also use the proficiency scale.
- 5. The Ministry is replacing the current "I" (incomplete) grade with a new 'IE' (insufficient evidence) grade.

As professionals and experts in learning and assessment, you care deeply about how teachers report about student progress to families. Further, this new order may impact your workload. It's critical that the Ministry of Education hear directly from teachers. This legislation will ensure that services are delivered equitably and allow communities to better advocate for themselves."
